Faculty Advisor's Note

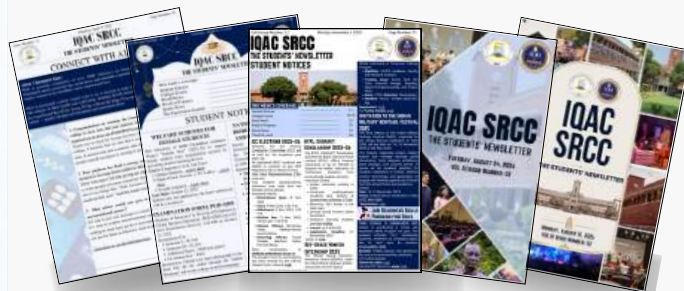
Dear Readers,

The idea of a "Student Newsletter" found its spirit with an email I received on January 08, 2025. The brainchild of **Anjali Teja**, **Astha Rathod**, and **Nayonikaa Gupta** (who all later became the founding student editors of the Newsletter), these three friends and enterprising students approached me with the idea of a "Student Newsletter" for the SRCC Community. For a while, the College had been investing in communication channels such as social media and SmartProf SRCC and was looking to further enhancing its frequency and access of information to students. This idea, therefore, came at a very opportune time. Immediately, with these students at the helm, we set course for the formalisation of the idea of the Newsletter, primarily envisioned for students as a quality initiative for communication and support. In the two weeks that followed, the idea of the IQAC SRCC was refined, sublimed and crystallised through a few meetings, discussions and couple of rounds of reiterations. These discussions and reiterations focussed on framing the vision, the objectives, the broad contours and the policies of the Newsletter which as an idea sought to act as a periodic and compiled source of information about the College events and announcements for the students. The focus was also on setting course for the content inclusions and design of the Newsletter. As an outcome, the IQAC SRCC's "The Students' Newsletter" was formalised in a substantive form and shape.

From there, the proposal for the idea, form and substance of the Students Newsletter was taken to Prof. Aruna Jha, Vice-Principal, SRCC and then Coordinator, IQAC SRCC for her approval. It took her less than 30 seconds to give her approval to this novel initiative. One does not simply find enough expressions of gratitude to her vision and prompt decision making with student development as its axis.

The IQAC SRCC's Students' Newsletter then debuted with its first issue on Tuesday, January 28, 2025, in Academic Year 2024-25 as a simple six-page compendium with three sections namely, "Events in the College", "Student Notices", and "Around the World". Hidden in these six pages was the painstaking efforts of the three founding student editors and six junior team members. In the 567 days since then, the Newsletter has expanded its page count to a reader-friendly ten pages and its sections to five to include news and students' expressions.

Today, with the publication of the Volume III, Issue 3, the IQAC SRCC's "The Students' Newsletter" marks its 50th release. It is indeed heartening to see the fiftieth release of the "The Student Newsletter" in the Centenary Year of Shri Ram College of Commerce, marking the issue as an august moment in Year of highlights for the College.



The Issue 1 of Volume I of the IQAC SRCC's "The Students' Newsletter" was published on **January 28, 2025**, in the Academic Year 2024-25. Since then, 50 issues of the Students' Newsletter have been published under 3 Volumes corresponding to the Academic Year 2024-25, 2025-26 and now, 2026-27 consecutively. Since its commencement, the Newsletter has continued to expand to new sections to enhance the reader's information and experience.

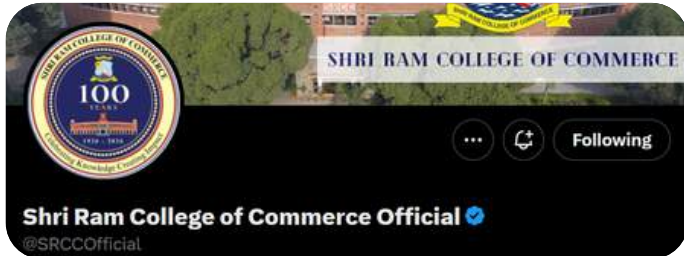

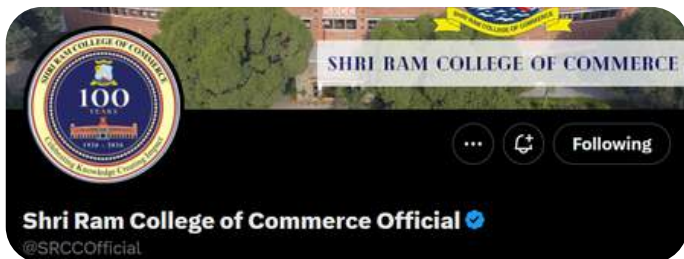

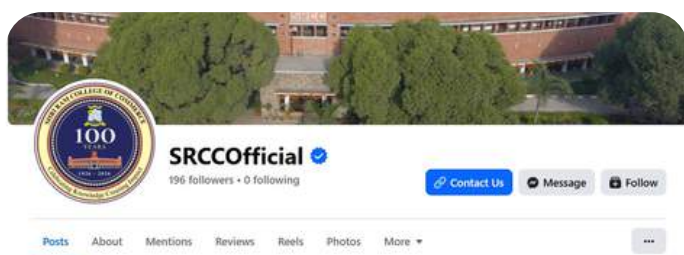

INVITATION TO PARTICIPATE IN NATIONAL LEVEL LETTER WRITING COMPETITION

The Department of Posts, Government of India, is organising the National Level 'Dhai Akhar' Letter Writing Campaign for FY 2026–27, centered on the theme **"A Letter to Mother Earth: My Promise to Protect Nature."** Aimed at re-introducing younger generations to philately and promoting handwriting as a vital medium of self-expression and environmental advocacy, the competition is open to all citizens across two distinct age categories: **Up to 18 years** and **Above 18 years**.

Participants may draft their submissions in English, Hindi, or any vernacular language, strictly in handwritten format on either Inland Letter Cards (maximum 500 words) or plain A4 sheets enclosed in an envelope (maximum 1,000 words). Submissions must include an age certification declaration ("*I certify that I am below/above the age of 18 as on 01/01/2026*"). The top three entries in each category stand to win attractive cash awards of up to **₹25,000 at the Circle Level** and **₹50,000 at the National Level**.

The submission window is active from **1 August 2026 to 31 October 2026**, with Circle Level results scheduled for declaration by **31 December 2026**. ATTENDANCE GUIDELINES UNDER ORDINANCE VII

Under Ordinance VII of the University of Delhi, all students must maintain a minimum of two-thirds (66.67%) attendance across lectures, practicals, tutorials, and presentations to remain eligible for Semester Examinations. This requirement ensures consistent academic engagement and statutory compliance.

Failure to meet the prescribed attendance may result in disciplinary action, including detention and disqualification from appearing in Semester Examinations, in accordance with University rules. Students should regularly monitor their attendance to avoid academic penalties.

Any discrepancy in attendance records should be reported to the respective course teacher for verification and rectification. Complete regulatory provisions and procedures are available in the attached official document.

NEWS AROUND THE WORLD

CHAMOLI TUNNEL ACCIDENT LEAVES SEVEN WORKERS DEAD

Seven workers died and one remains missing after water and debris entered an under-construction THDC tunnel near Pipalkoti in Uttarakhand's Chamoli district on August 13. Fourteen workers were rescued and hospitalized. Officials suspect a landslide created a cavity above the tunnel, allowing water and debris to enter, while rising water has hampered rescue efforts.

BALD RANGE WILDFIRE TRIGGERS EMERGENCY IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

British Columbia declared a state of emergency on August 8 as the Bald Range wildfire nearly doubled to 9,500 hectares. Over 20,000 people were evacuated from Summerland, Peachland and nearby areas, with homes destroyed and power outages reported. Firefighters were also battling over 100 wildfires across the province, with support from Mexico, Australia and France.

ANDRÁS BAKA TAKES OFFICE AS HUNGARY'S PRESIDENT

Hungary's parliament elected former judge András Baka as president with 140 votes in favour and six against. The 73-year-old, a former European Court of Human Rights judge, was removed as Supreme Court president in 2011 under Viktor Orbán's government. Baka is expected to oversee constitutional and institutional reforms under Prime Minister Péter Magyar's administration.

INDIA FACES US SCRUTINY OVER CHINESE GOODS TRANSHIPMENT

The US has listed India among 40+ economies at risk of being used to reroute Chinese goods to the US to avoid tariffs. India is in the report's Tier 1 group alongside Japan, South Korea, Mexico, Canada and the EU. While no Indian companies or shipments were specifically accused of violations, tighter customs checks and AI-based screening could increase scrutiny of Indian exporters and their country-of-origin documentation.

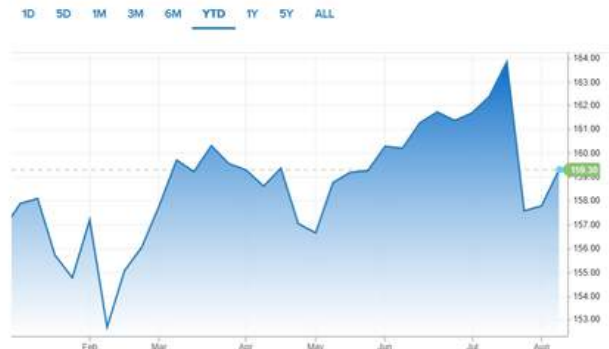

WHY THE YEN KEEPS FALLING DESPITE JAPAN'S INTERVENTION

U.S.-Japan intervention briefly boosted the yen, but its impact faded due to persistent exchange-rate fundamentals. The wide interest rate gap continues to encourage the yen carry trade, with investors borrowing yen to invest in higher-yielding U.S. assets, supporting the dollar. While intervention can curb speculation, it is insufficient to permanently strengthen the yen.

India and Canada are moving toward renewed economic cooperation, with Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's visit marking a key step in restoring ties. Canada's over C\$100 billion investment in India provides a strong foundation for deeper economic ties.

WALL STREET BETS ON A FED PAUSE

Wall Street is increasingly expecting the Federal Reserve to pause its rate hikes as weak retail sales, declining consumer confidence, and cooling inflation point to a slowing economy. Markets currently see a 71.4% probability of unchanged interest rates in September, which could benefit bonds and other rate-sensitive stocks by easing borrowing pressures. The Fed's next decision will depend heavily on upcoming employment and inflation data, which will provide clearer signals about economic strength and consumer demand going forward this quarter.

INDIA IS CREATING JOBS. BUT IS IT CREATING LIVELIHOODS?

India's employment story is improving. But the real measure of development is whether work gives people security, dignity and the freedom to build a better future.

A small shopkeeper opens his shutters each morning, uncertain whether the day's earnings will be enough to cover his household expenses. In another corner of the city, a graduate from a university goes through various job websites in search of a job fitting her profile. Early in the morning, a domestic worker steps out of her house for it is a no-payday for a non-workday.

They all are workers. They all participate in the economy. Yet the experience of work is not the same for all of them. This raises a question that economic indicators alone cannot answer: Is employment truly improving the lives of those who depend on it?

It is hard to overlook the economic growth in India. Economic growth has come along with the development of its infrastructure, increasing connectivity through digital means, growing investments, and a labour market that, according to the recently released statistics, has made some progress. India's Periodic Labour Force Survey (PLFS) states that the rate of participation of labour force in India of people aged above 15 was 59.3% in 2025, whereas the rate of unemployment among educated people went down from 7.0% in 2024 to 6.5% in 2025. The share of people working in regular wage or salaried jobs rose from 22.4% to 23.6%.

Work provides information about one's employment. It does not necessarily imply that this individual is earning sufficiently to lead a secure life, that she or he has healthcare options, can survive unemployment for some time, learn new skills or see any chances of a better future.

This is precisely the point in relation to economist Amartya Sen's Capability Approach, according to which development should be measured not by earnings or production alone, but by an increase in the real freedoms and capabilities of the people. Thus, the issue here is not about whether or not one has work. It is about whether or not this work increases his/her capabilities. Think about the fast growing gig economy in India. Platforms have provided easier access to work and new opportunities to millions of people. With minimal training, an individual with insufficient education becomes a delivery person, a driver or a provider of services via platforms.

According to NITI Aayog, India had about 7.7 million gig workers in 2020, and that number was expected to increase to 23.5 million in 2029-30. Clearly, the growth of such employment indicates that the very nature of employment is transforming. The old employment pattern of having one employer, one workplace, and one permanent employment relationship is increasingly being complemented by platform-based employment, freelancing, contract employment and other flexible arrangements. Thus, the policy issue is not to ignore gig work. Rather, it is to make sure that flexibility is not another term for vulnerability.

Work statistics can tell us whether people are employed. However, they fall short of telling us whether the work being done is productive, secure and able to transform people's lives.

The issue becomes even more pressing given the scale of India's informal economy. Informal work continues to be deeply entrenched in the country's labour market such that a significant number of workers continue to lack income security, job security and social protection. This has been pointed out by the International Labour Organisation, in particular in respect of agricultural, construction, domestic and casual work sectors.

While a person working on a salary with some savings and health cover might consider missing work days merely inconvenient, a day's labour can mean the choice between healthcare and rent in case of a labourer. And it is not just about money but about freedom and security as well.

The same issue becomes increasingly relevant in connection with the increasing use of artificial intelligence which is transforming the labor market. Most discussions are concerned with whether AI would take the place of workers. Yet, at least equally relevant is the ability of workers to adjust to the transformed jobs that AI will bring along.

And while the demographic dividend of India is not to be underestimated, it does not become such automatically. It can become one only if the young population has access to good education, healthcare, necessary skills and mobility. This point is made clear even in the Economic Survey 2025-26.

India has to start thinking about job creation in a different way.

It should not strive for maximum employment in absolute terms. The goal should be the creation of decent and productive employment that expands the range of choices available to people. Skilling programs need to reflect actual labour market needs. And productivity gains from technologies have to be used to generate better opportunities for workers rather than higher income for capital alone.

India does not have to sacrifice either its economy or its citizens' well-being. On the contrary, the two are very much interconnected. A healthy and educated workforce is more productive. Workers who are capable of acquiring new skills can better adjust to changing technological realities. Thus, it would not be an issue whether India generates employment opportunities.

What needs to be considered is the kind of life that these jobs allow their employees.

A nation cannot gauge development only by measuring the number of jobs created or the percentage of contribution to GDP. What matters is whether development allows workers to access healthcare without being afraid; graduates to create careers instead of looking for jobs; women empowerment through employment and not having to rely on one source of income to survive.

India's development will ultimately be measured not by how many people have work, but by whether that work gives them the security, dignity and opportunity to build a better life.

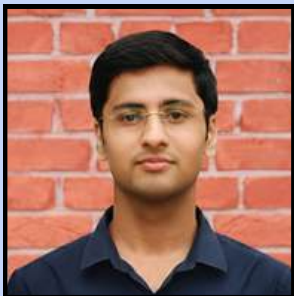

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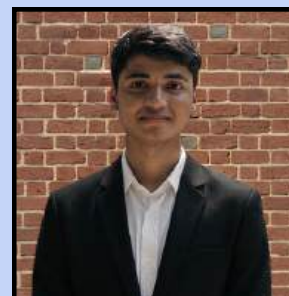
