We are reaching out to you to share fellowship / Scholarship opportunities for meritorious girls admitted in UG/PG courses at your prestigious institution.

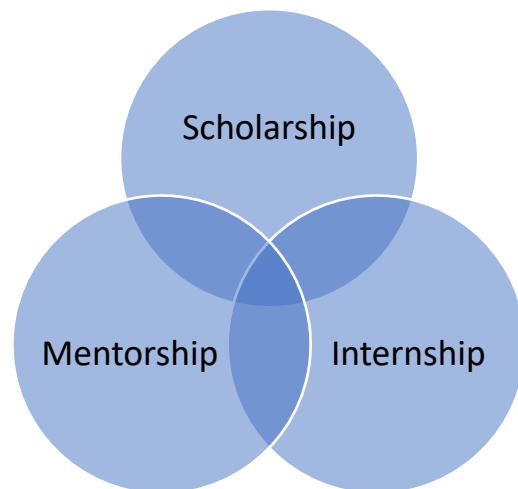

Selection Criteria

The program is open all over India for students selected / enrolled in a UG/PG degree course in government colleges/ universities.

Scholarship:

- ▶ Scholarship is open to meritorious students from economically weaker sections of the society. Being from a 'Below Poverty Line' family should ordinarily be sufficient to receive the scholarship. However, special cases can be considered by the selection committee if a candidate is exceptionally brilliant, and her family is not able to support her studies (though not a BPL family).
- ▶ The scholarship amount covers the college tuition fee of the selected student, deposited directly in the institution's account, and would not be given to the student. The college/university would be required to provide institution's bank account details where the funds are to be deposited.
- ▶ If the student has already deposited the fee, it is upto the college administration to reimburse it to the student or use it for student's next year fee.
- ▶ Selection of the students will be based on -
 - ▶ Academic achievement.
 - ▶ Financial need, and
 - ▶ Vision and commitment to serve society.

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- ▶ Scholarship will be renewed annually based on academic performance. If the winner does not meet the criteria in any year, her scholarship will be discontinued, however, it may recommence from a subsequent year, if the criteria is met. The decision to discontinue / re-commence would be taken by our scholarship selection committee and would be final.
- ▶ scholarship funds will be awarded only for the normal duration of the course, with or without breaks due to detention or voluntary skipping of a year.

Fellowship

- ▶ Fellowship is open to any girl student interested in serving society. These students would get the Fellowship certificate and will be eligible for internships after completing atleast 100 hours of documented community service.

Application Process

- ▶ Each student must submit the application through the application portal located on our website homepage. Our selection committee will shortlist the students and will send the list to the college/institution head for approval.
- ▶ **Pay Forward:** All scholarship / fellowship recipients are required to pledge that they will commence supporting at least 3 other girls to complete college / vocational education, within a time limit of 3 years after completing their own education. The Foundation would connect them to such deserving girls.

Heal the Humanity 1.0 In this phase, we methodically established strategic partnerships with the Government of India and Maersk Shipping Corporation, to restore the Supply Chain. Armed with the support of Govt of India and Maersk, we reached out to our network of institutions. Within a

span of less than 2 weeks, we received medical supplies worth more than 15 million USD, including a major donation from Harvard. Maersk provided pro bono shipping services and delivered these supplies in India.

Heal the Humanity 2.0

We are now expanding our endeavor across the globe to strengthen the healthcare systems under the guidance and supervision of global experts. This will enhance donations and global shipping of philanthropic medical supplies, Telemedicine, Telementoring, Scholar exchange programs, and other educational events. This structured and streamlined endeavor works on the principles of the ‘economy of scale’ as well as ‘economy of scope’ and bolsters the conglomeration of Government-Corporation-Nongovernment agencies as exemplified by the ‘Heal the Humanity 1.0’.

results were published as a book, Sacred Mandates by University of Chicago press. The book has received rave reviews across the globe as a definitive historical guide to international and intrastate relations in Asia, of interest to policymakers and scholars alike, for years to come.

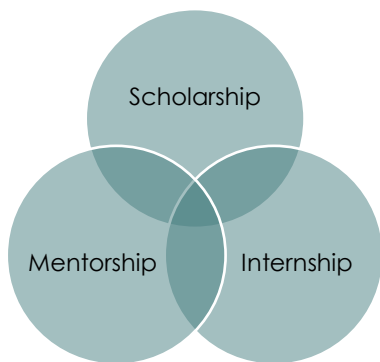

Princeton Foundation, working in the field of women empowerment since 2011, announced the result of the national competition of Fellowship for Peace and Learning 2022-23. More than 800 students applied for the fellowship from across India, and 100 students were finally selected for the fellowship that covers their college tuition. Our winners demonstrate not only outstanding academic achievements, but grit, determination, and the unwavering commitment to pursue higher education as evident in their academic performance as well as their application essays.



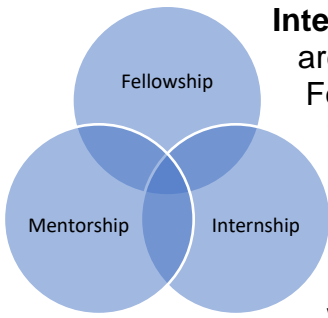
- More than 73% of eligible girls (aged 18-23 years) in India aren't even enrolling in colleges. All India Survey Report on Higher Education 2020

The Fellowship for Peace and Learning started in the holy city of Varanasi, India, 2011. Since then, the foundation has awarded approx. 300 fellowships to enable brilliant girls to graduate from various colleges all over India. 2022-23 awardees include female students admitted for undergraduate degree courses in humanities as well as STEM courses at Miranda House in New Delhi, Vasant Kanya Mahavidhyalaya in Varanasi, University of Agricultural Sciences in Bangalore, Telangana Mahila Viswavidyalayam in Koti, and Govt Degree College for Women in Begumpet, Telangana. The winners represent different states including Andhra Pradesh, Kerala, Bihar, Delhi, Haryana, Madhya Pradesh, Rajasthan, Jharkhand, Uttarakhand, and Uttar Pradesh.

Pledge of Gratitude

I pledge that if I get selected for the Fellowship for Peace and Learning, I will support at least two or more girl students in the pursuit of self-empowerment in their life time.

(All winners of the fellowship are required to take this pledge)

· There are 1.8 billion young people (10-24 years old) in the world. Approximately half of them – 880 million – are adolescent girls and young women.

· A third of girls in developing countries (excluding China) are likely to be married before the age of 18 and one in nine girls will marry before their fifteenth birthday. In 2010, over 67 million women aged 20-24 had been married as girls. If such trends continue, 142 million girls will be married every year in the next decade.

· Globally, young women aged 15–24 are most vulnerable to HIV, with infection rates twice as high as in young men. Each minute one young woman acquires HIV, accounting for 22% of all new HIV infections, with sexual transmission being the dominant mode of infection.

· 2012 ILO estimates suggest that women and girls make up 55 per cent of the estimated 20.9 million people trafficked.

· Approximately 140 million girls and women in the world suffer female genital mutilation/cutting, with more than 3 million girls in Africa annually at risk of it.
